Intro:

This booklet highlights the activities of Farm and Infrastructure Foundation (FIF), towards changing the policy landscape for food security in Nigeria, which in terms of a mind, policy and practice change in the notion of food, from the traditional notion of food as a mere human need to the contemporary notion of food as a fundamental human right. In this wise, the FIF operates a mantra that is: “Although technology matters, policy also matters even the more”.

Accordingly, the flagship project of FIF is “National Campaign on Right to Food in Nigeria”, representing the so-called 'legacy project' of the Founder/President of Farm and Infrastructure Foundation (FIF), Professor G. B. Ayoola. Thus, the legacy project represents a one-stop-shop for curing the several impediments in the way of food security in the country, bordering on issues about Voice and accountability, Political stability and violence, government effectiveness, regulatory quality, rule of law, and control of corruption. Over time, these impediments culminates in an entrenched culture of policy impunity, whereby the successive failure of policies and programmes of agricultural development is practically inconsequential.

Therefore, the Right to food Act (No. 34 2023) is essentially a policy responsibility and policy accountability Act for introducing consequentiality into the policy process for national food security.

Suffice it to say that in a right to food policy regime the obligation of government is threefold, which is to a) respect the right, b) to protect the right and c) to fulfill the right; otherwise, any instance of proven violation, contravention or gross abuse of the right is legally punishable under the Act and by the Act.

LEGACY PROJECT

Following an intellectual stocktaking mission abroad for three months in 1996, (at Heady Hall Iowa State University, Ames, Iowa USA), I Founded the Farm and Infrastructure Foundation (FIF) in 1999, as an organization for policy influencing and promoting policy best practices in food security, agriculture and rural development, through public spirited policy advocacy, knowledge-driven policy brokerage and evidence-based policy action research

The flagship project of FIF is the National Campaign on Right to Food in Nigeria, which was conceptualised in 2007 and launched in 2008, wherein the vision appeared of constitutional right to food: and where upon professional action began in earnest towards actualising it

Toward this end, in 2010, I submitted a memorandum to the Constitution Amendment Committees of Senate and House of Representatives, to propose a backbone law for operationalising the right to food in Nigeria, both of which Committees outrightly rejected the idea of a constitutional right to food for the country.

Then I entered the National Assembly directly, by way of a Private Member's Bill that I authored and Introduced at the instance of FIF to the House of Representatives during the 6th Assembly (2007-2011) targeting chapter two; the Bill passed the First Reading only at the expiration of that assembly. Next I reintroduced the same Bill at Senate during the 7th Assembly (2011-2015), now targeting chapter four,



but which also failed at First Reading Stage. Then I reworked the contents of the Bill and reintroduced it to both chambers simultaneously during the 8th Assembly (2015-2019); which passed the Second Reading at the Senate at this time, but still failed in both chambers thereafter.

Last, I reintroduced the Hill to both chambers during the 9th Assembly (2019-2023), which then passed through the First, Second and Third Readings, and also passed the committee stage for voting in March 2022, when the Bill was overwhelmingly passed at the national level Senate (81 YES vs 5 NOs), House of Representatives (296 YES vs 2 NOs) Subsequently, the Bill was similarly passed at state level in December 2022, when all the 27 states that had voted on the Bill had ratified it without exception.

Going by this result, it is obvious that the generality of Nigerians have expressed their innate desire for food as a human right and demanded appropriate policies for actualising it, which forms the basis for President Mohammadu Buhari to expressly sign the Bill into law in March 2023, thereby becoming a constitutional law of the land (The Right to Food-Food Security Act No. 34 of 2023).

Thus, herein we have a lasting legacy bestowed on the country for the benefit of the food poor majority, and for which I am practically elated, nay excited, and so much grateful to the Almighty God.

Nonetheless, implementation of this Act is a different kettle of fish, depending on the disposition of government to initiating and sustaining effective implementation. Therefore we urge the government at all levels to act responsibly in deploying sufficient resources in this direction soonest.

Father of Right To Food Act In Nigeria

Logic and Phasing of the Project



The Nigeria's Right to Food Act (No. 34, 2023) is a policy responsibility and policy accountability law, but not an apology of state socialism that requires government to provide food for citizens free of charge. The logic behind the Right to food Act is that policy failure rather than technology failure is responsible for food insecurity of the country since independence in 1960. Specifically, the problem lies with the human environment in which the policy process is governed, which is characterized by several impediments namely – lack of voice and accountability, political instability and violence, government ineffectiveness, poor regulatory quality, absence of rule of law, and uncontrolled corruption. These impediments having persisted in the policy governance environment for many years, have created an entrenched culture of policy impunity, in the sense that successive failure of food security policies and programmes in the country is practically inconsequential. It is in this regard that the Nigeria's Right to Food Act was conceived as an all-purpose cure for policy impunity by introducing consequentiality and deterrence into the policy governance process, such that, henceforth, failure of food security policies and programmes is actionable, justiciable and ultimately remediable by law.

Accordingly, thanks to the National Campaign on Right to Food in Nigeria project of Farm and Infrastructure Foundation (FIF

www.fifnig.org), implemented since 2008, the Right to Food Bill was introduced at National Assembly in 2010 as a constitution amendment Bill to seek recognition of food as a fundamental human right in Nigeria; which, following sustained policy influencing and legislative advocacy the Bill was passed at the national and state assemblies by 2022 and subsequently signed into law in March 2023.

The Campaign was designed in three phases of which the first two phases have been implemented successfully but fund is required to implement the third phase –

Phase 1 - Short term: 2008 – 2010 (3 Years): Inception activities for implementing the National Campaign on Right to Food

Phase 2: Medium term: 2010-2023 (13 years): Policy and Legislative Advocacy activities towards the passage of the Right to Food Bill

Phase 3 – Long term: 2023 – 2030 (7 years): Implementation and Deployment activities towards the realization of the purpose of the Right to Food.

Trajectory of Legislative Bill

The initiative for a constitution amendment law on Right to Food commenced in 2010 during 6th Assembly (2007–2011) in terms of a Memorandum to that effect submitted to the two National Assembly Committees on Constitution Review (House and Senate). The Memorandum proposed an amendment of Chapter 2 and Chapter 4 of the 1999 Constitution for explicit recognition of food as a fundamental human right. However, even though both Committees were followed up to the venues of all the six zonal hearings in that year, at which the Memorandum was formally and physically presented by FIF (making 12 presentations in all parts of the country), the proposal failed to be mentioned in the reports of both Committees, let alone recommended to the respective chambers of National Assembly for further consideration and subsequent voting.

- ❖ Sixth Assembly (2007-2011) - Thus, further to the failed attempt, the Memorandum was reduced to a legislative Bill, which was directly introduced in the House of Representatives by way of a “Private Member's Bill”, later in 2010. The legislative Bill was seeking an amendment of Chapter 2 of the constitution. But this attempt also failed at the First Reading stage before the tenure of that assembly expired in 2011.
- ❖ Seventh Assembly (2011-2015) – Then the Bill was freshly introduced at the Senate, seeking amendment of Chapter 4 of the constitution and vigorously pursued in terms of legislative advocacy and increased commitment. However, it also failed at First Reading stages in both chambers, before the expiration of that assembly in 2015.
- ❖ Eighth Assembly (2015-2019) - The two Bills reviewed and recast by FIF into a single legislative Bill, and simultaneously reintroduced at both the House of Representatives and Senate; at which time the Bill succeeded past the First Reading and Second

Reading stages, thereby entering the committee stage in each chamber. However, the Bill failed again, so it was not tabled for the Third and final Reading in either chamber, before the tenure of that assembly expired in 2019.

- ❖ Ninth Assembly (2019-2023) - the current version of the Bill was reintroduced, again by FIF in both chambers, following which it smoothly progressed in passage from First Reading to Second Reading, and to Committee/Third reading stages, successfully; and eventually received the blessing of the individual and joint committees of the Constitution review committees, thereby reaching the stage of voting. Voting took place in each chamber in March 2022 when it was overwhelmingly passed – House of Representatives (296 YES vs 2 NOs); and Senate (81 YES vs 5 NOs).

The necessary next step was to meet the mandatory requirement of a YES vote in 2/3 of the 36 States of the Federation (24 States) for their concurrence with the Bill, before seeking the assent of the President to sign it into law. Fortuitously, by December 2022, with vigorous advocacy work the Bill had received the YES votes of 27 States; so, it subsequently received the presidential assent on 3rd March 2023.

A Bill

For

An Act to alter the Constitution of the Federal Republic of Nigeria, 1999 to require the Government to direct its policy towards ensuring right to food and food security in Nigeria; and for related matters.

[] Commencement

ENACTED by the National Assembly of the Federal Republic of Nigeria—

1. The Constitution of the Federal Republic of Nigeria, 1999 (in this Act referred to as "the Principal Act") is altered as set out in this Act. Alteration of the Constitution

2. Section 16 of the Principal Act is altered —

Alteration of section 16

(a) in subsection 2 (d), by substituting for the words "suitable and adequate food" the words "right to food and food security"; and

(b) by inserting after section 16, a new section "16A" —

"Food security.

16A. (1) The State shall direct its policy towards ensuring that —

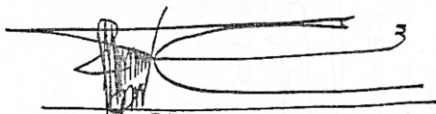
(a) strategies that guarantee food security of the nation regarding availability, accessibility, and affordability of food to the citizens are initiated, undertaken, and implemented;

(b) the means of production, conservation and distribution of food are upgraded and improved upon on a continuous basis; and

(c) adequate measures are provided to ensure that food security of the nation is not compromised by any individual, group, or institution.

3. This Act may be cited as the Constitution of the Federal Republic of Nigeria, 1999 (Fifth Alteration) (No. 34) Act, 2023. Citation

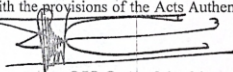
